Last year's 15 recipients donated a total of 223 years of service to Texas schools.

The board has recognized 450 outstanding school volunteers with this award since its creation in 1994.

Examples of volunteer service provided by past Heroes include activities such as mentoring children, assisting teachers, organizing fundraisers, spearheading bond campaigns, and doing much more to help create happy, thriving school cultures

This year, the recipients will be recognized at the board's Sept. 13 meeting in Austin. Each recipient will receive a plaque and a resolution. Their names will also be engraved on a perpetual plaque outside the board room.

# Regional Coordination Rampant Porch Lizards Sundance Square's **Committee March Presentations Online**

The presentations from the March 18 NAS Fort Worth JRB Regional Coordination Committee meeting have been posted online. The February 2019 meeting summary that was approved at the March meeting has also been posted. The presentations and the meeting summary can be https://www.nctcog.org/trans/about/committees/rcc.

The next meeting has been rescheduled from the date and location previously provided. The next meeting will be July 8 at 1:30 p.m. at the Fort Worth Mounted Patrol Building, 1901 N. Las Vegas Trail, Fort Worth, TX 76108.

The Legislature approved \$30 million for the Defense Economic Adjustment Assistance Grants (DEAAG) program for the FY 20-21 biennium. A presentation on DEAAG is scheduled for the July RCC meeting. The bill adding military installations to the list of critical infrastructure passed. If HB 3082 is signed by the Governor then UAS will be prohibited from flying over military installations or near enough to cause a disruption. There will be a legislative update at the July meeting.

# Texas State-Fish Art Contest Announces 2019 Winners

The Texas Freshwater Fisheries Center has announced the Texas division of Wildlife Forever's State-Fish Art Contest winners for 2019.

The State-Fish Art Contest is part of a conservation education program designed to interest youth in fishing by encouraging K-12 students to submit original artwork of any officially designated state fish and an essay or poem about the participant's fish entry, its habitat or efforts to conserve it. This year, judges at the Texas Freshwater Fisheries Center chose the top 12 out of 444 total entries from Texas students.

In the K-3 category, winners are: First Place, Emma Hadzhieva of Fort Worth; Second Place, Clement Wang of Keller; Third Place, Ivory Vanover of Keller.

Honorable mentions for Texas students in grades K-3 are: Neeharika Bharatham of Lewisville, Ellie Kim of Flower Mound, Yuna Kim of Allen, Santiago Lesczynski of Silsbee.

In the grades 4–6 category, winners are: First Place, Hyunjeong Roh of Coppell; Second Place, Angela Rao of Southlake; Third Place, Sophia Yu of Fort Worth.

Honorable mentions in grades 4-6 are: Shreya Basak of Irving, Morgan Goodman of Grapevine, Kelly Hwang of Frisco, Jonah Kim of Flower Mound, Sophia Liu of Coppell, Alivia Shang of Coppell and Alanna Sun of Coppell.

In the grades 7–9 category, winners are: First Place, Julia Jarmulak of Roanoke; Second Place, Anish Goel of Irving; Third Place, Joshua Thomas of Southlake.

Honorable mentions for grades 7–9 are: Elise Akin of Irving, Ela Guo of Dallas, Diya Hegde of Irving, Shrada Iyer of Coppell, Olivia Park of Dallas, Alice Won of Flower Mound and Ashley Zhang of Coppell.

In the grades 10-12 category, winners are: First Place, Gretchen Mabry of Keller; Second Place, Madeleine Alexander of Keller; Third Place, Juliann Dooley of Warren.

Honorable mentions for grades 10–12 are: Gavin Hardy of Warren, Stacy Hong of Irving, Neha Lalani of Coppell, Katrian Mahon of Silsbee, Ivina Sakharova of Fort Worth, Yue Taira of Irving and Sophia Zhukova of Frisco.

Scholarships in the grades 10–12 division are \$1,000 for first place, \$750 for second place and \$500 for third place. Awards in the 4-6 and 7-9 grade levels are \$200 for first, \$150 for second and \$100 for third. In the K-3 division awards are \$100 for first, \$75 for second and \$50 for third.

First-place entries advanced to the national level and compete against winners from other states. Although none of the Texas entries won a national first place prize, the first place Texas winners will go up against the rest of the state entries for a 2019 People's Choice Award, which is voted on during the State-Fish Art Expo being held August 9-11, 2019 at the Hot Springs Convention Center in Hot Springs, Arkansas.




"This class helps us all identify the best tools to help our children solve problems at school and in life." said Session 201 graduate, Juanita Arellano.

Texas History Minute

# Texas Hotelier, Conrad Hilton by Dr. Ken Bridges

Texas has been known for producing colorful, larger-than-life business figures. That has been found in a variety of industries. Perhaps one of the most unusual was hotel magnate **Conrad Hilton**, whose multi-billion dollar hotel chain began in Texas by accident.

Conrad Hilton was born in what was then the New Mexico Territory on Christmas Day, 1887. He was one of eight children. His father was a Norwegian immigrant and businessman who taught his son how to run a business. His father ran a small general store and eventually converted it into a small hotel.



He was very ambitious as a young man. He briefly attended two small New Mexico colleges. When New Mexico became a state in 1912, he was elected to the first session of the new state's House of Representatives. He served in the army during World War I and returned determined to be a successful banker, seeking a small bank to buy outright. He located a bank in Cisco, Texas, not far from Abilene. The bank purchase fell through, so Hilton bought the local hotel instead. With oilfield workers streaming into the small town, the hotel was an overwhelming success.

Hilton started buying more hotels. By 1924, he built a new hotel in Dallas, the fourteen-story Dallas Hilton, which he completed for more than \$1.3 million (or \$19.4 million in 2019 dollars). In Dallas, he also settled down and married Mary Barron, with whom he would have three sons. He continued to expand, building new hotels in Abilene and Waco in the late 1920s.

However, the road to success was not smooth. In 1929, Hilton built his next hotel, the San Angelo Hilton. It was built at a cost of \$1 million (nearly \$15 million in 2019 dollars). However, the stock market crash and the onset of the Great Depression caused business travel to evaporate, and the hotel almost became a victim of the Depression.

Hilton had taken out a loan for \$385,000 from American Life Insurance Company of Galveston. When Hilton was unable to pay the mortgage, the company foreclosed and forced Hilton into a partnership with them. The shotgun marriage dissolved by 1934 amidst a series of lawsuits, and he lost the hotel. The experience nearly ruined Hilton just as his hotel empire was beginning. His former partners later renamed it the Cactus Hotel and ran it for another thirty years before it was donated to a local hospital and converted to a nursing home. Hilton rebounded and kept adding properties.

In spite of Hilton's success in the hotel business, his private life was a Texas-sized soap opera. His nine-year marriage to the mother his three young sons ended in divorce in 1934, at a time when divorce was still considered scandalous. Hilton became notorious for his string of young girlfriends and drinking. In 1942, he married actress Zsa Zsa Gabor. It was Hilton's second of three marriages. It was the second of nine marriages for Gabor. The marriage was a storm of trouble from the beginning. The marriage produced a daughter, the long-troubled Francesca Hilton, Gabor's only child. The bitter divorce came in 1946. Hilton would not marry again for thirty years. Gabor alleged years later that Hilton assaulted her during the marriage and even had an affair with his eldest son. However, she made these allegations years after both men had died and were unable to respond to the charges.

In the meantime, his son Nicky Hilton developed a reputation of his own. He married actress Elizabeth Taylor in 1950, but the marriage collapsed within a matter of months. His drinking and gambling destroyed his marriages and his health before his death in 1969.

Hilton moved onward and bought the Stevens Hotel in Chicago at the end of World War II, then the largest hotel in the world. He created the Hilton Hotels Corporation in 1946 as a holding company for his properties. In 1949, he bought New York's famed Waldorf Astoria Hotel, a hotel that had long since become a landmark and become synonymous with luxury. By this point, his holdings were worth an estimated \$100 million (more than \$1.06 billion in 2019 dollars). "Successful men keep moving," he said in an interview. "They make mistakes, but they don't quit."

By the 1950s, he brought his son Barron on board as vice-president. The father-son team managed to keep expanding the Hilton Hotel chain around the globe. By 1955, they guaranteed that each room would have its own air conditioning, an unheard-of luxury at the time. In the midst of his rise, he established the Conrad Hilton Foundation, dedicated to alleviating suffering around the world.

Hilton died in 1979 at age 91 and was buried in Dallas. Even in death, one more scandal erupted surrounding his will. Though son Barron had been left in charge of the company, he did not receive any money. He sued and eventually was given a large amount of stock in the hotel chain. Years later, he announced he would be leaving the bulk of his fortune to the Hilton Foundation, much as his father had done. Today, Hilton Worldwide Holdings boasts 5,500 properties in 109 countries and is worth \$14 billion.
