What is Discrimination?

The treatment or consideration of, or making a distinction in favor or against, a person based on the group, class, or category to which the person belongs. Discrimination may be either intentional, by neglect, or by the actions or lack of actions based on membership in one of the protected groups.

Examples of unlawful discrimination include:

- •Giving one group or type of participants larger or extra helpings of food
- •Separating genders
- •Failing to provide children with a dietary disability accommodating meals

•Failing to provide program information to all potential program applicants
